

#### Introduction

According to SME Corporation Malaysia, 98.5% of business establishments in Malaysia are SMEs that cut across all sizes and sectors. There are 907,065 establishments of SMEs in Malaysia which contributes 36.6% of Malaysia's GDP in 2016.

According to David Risser, a director and partner of corporate governance consultants Nestor Advisors, SMEs view corporate governance with skepticism and consider it to be only relevant to large companies. He added that SMEs around the globe are not aware of the huge benefits the implementation of strong corporate governance systems can give companies. Development institutions have found that two-thirds of SMEs non-performing portfolios are due to weak governance. Many developed and developing countries as well as international organisations have come out with the guidelines for good corporate governance practices. However, most guidelines focus on the public listed companies, not on SMEs.

Cheryl Khor, Deloitte Malaysia's partner for enterprise risk services, said that the adoption of corporate governance practices definitely adds value to SMEs, even if they are not looking to get listed. SMEs that apply corporate governance practices do not need to report to the Securities Commission, but they will see the value of these practices in their businesses. The companies will be driven in a better, more sustainable direction.

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
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
